## FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



It has been such an honor and privilege to join the YWRC this year. After more than 12 years in the social work field, primarily residential and intense intervention, I am excited to be part of prevention. It is absolutely critical to invest in programs and opportunities that will prevent our participants from finding themselves in

situations of trauma and increase their skills to continue to rise up as empowered women. However, we know we cannot always avoid traumatic experiences - especially as we continue to bear witness to institutional structures that enforce inequity, which leads to public health issues such as racism, mental health and poverty.

We have found ourselves in a very critical part of history. We cannot stay silent and we cannot expect others to do the work for us. This year, the YWRC has taken steps towards putting our equity value into action. Through YWRC Empowerment groups, After School groups, Young Mom's programming, and counseling, each participant is building a safe, trusting relationship with an adult, a key component of building resiliency. Our programming provided crucial, safe places this year (even virtually) as participants navigated intense new realities.

I have watched the team members of the YWRC with awe. They are incredibly talented and wise. While they all passionately pursue the mission of the YWRC each and every day, they do so with taking great care of one another. It has been quite a challenging year and I am so thankful this is where I landed. I am deeply committed to this mission and to this team.

The YWRC will continue to move forward being an adaptable and transformational agency that will respond to community needs and serve our participants in the best possible way. 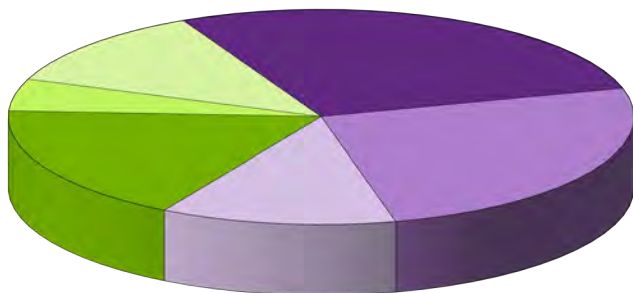

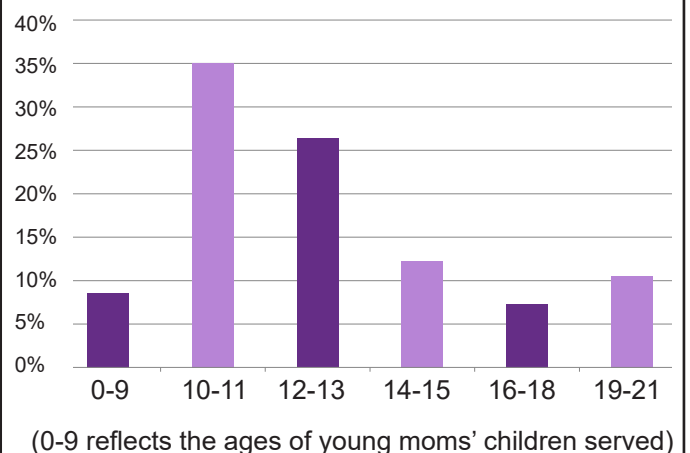

# IMPACT: COVID-19



The well-being of our participants, staff, volunteers and community is of the utmost importance to the YWRC. With this as our top priority, we determined it necessary to close to the public and started the transition to virtual programming and working from home in March of 2020 due to COVID-19. The remaining months of FY19-20 were full of changes, adaptation and growth. Through it all, our staff continually demonstrated great strength, lasting resiliency and a deep commitment to meeting the needs of our participants. Staff were also encouraged to utilize self-care time and frequent breaks as we navigated the new challenges.

The pandemic magnified risks and stressors, such as mental and emotional health, resource scarcity and overall safety. During a moment when the need for coping skills, trusted peers, safe spaces and basic needs was at its highest, the YWRC was challenged to develop new ways to reach participants virtually while maintaining the same consistency and positive impact of in-person programming. This shift included creative solutions to deliver group activity kits, snacks, meals and essential care items curbside, to stay in communication with participants online or over the phone, and to connect them with additional critical resources to meet their basic needs.

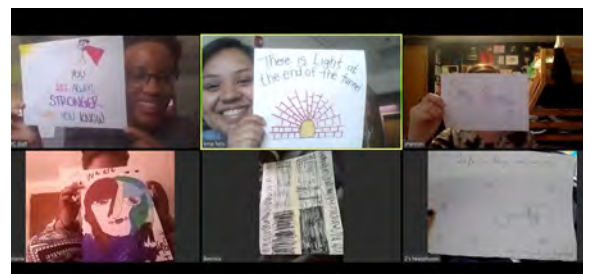

The shift of in-person groups at the YWRC to virtual along with the canceled in-person Greater Des Moines school groups affected our ability to reach our standard number of participants. While our ability to connect with girls and young women on a weekly basis within the schools ended early, our team made sure to be available for resources and support when needed.

Acknowledging the effect of the pandemic on all members or our community, the YWRC developed a resource page on our website anyone could access. This page housed updates about our office and programs, a resource page and ways folks could help. The resource page sections included reliable COVID-19 Information, Coping Skills & Helpful Hints, Community Updates and Activities & Things to Do.

The following haiku, written by a 12th grader during the virtual high school After School group, is a great snapshot of April 2020 and the importance of connection:

# CLIENT STORIES



## Tay'Shawna, Empowerment Participant, age 15

Excerpts from an essay written by Tay'Shawna, titled *"My Biggest Impact on my Life"*:

"Therapy has really changed me as a whole and has helped me with the most traumatic things that has happened in my life. I have had some of the best experiences while in therapy. Therapy has supported me in and outside of my appointments always making sure that I have someone to talk to. **I have become a stronger young lady and a very powerful woman because I learned how to understand my issues and how to deal with them the right way.**

One thing that therapy has taught me is that talking out your problems or issues is never a bad thing, it is a healing process. The reasons I go to therapy is to have someone just to talk to and tell them how my week is going and to get some stress off my chest. I also go to talk about the bad – things about 4 years ago when my brother died in a shooting and it really put a toll on my life. By telling those stories it really helped my feelings because all the anger and sadness would of just come all together and it would of explode. The best thing about therapy is what I tell that person stays in the room. Therapy has put me through many challenges, but very good ones that I didn't know I could achieve alone. I wouldn't be who I am today without therapy."

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## Samira, Young Mom Participant, age 20

At age 15, Samira found out she was pregnant. "I was so scared." She knew having her daughter meant giving up some of her childhood and the opportunity to do typical teenage things, but she committed to raising Ayah and hasn't looked back. She worked hard to triumphantly finish high school early, while adapting to raising a newborn, and joined her classmates on the stage.

Samira has been an engaged participant of our Young Moms program for more than five years and often serves as a mentor for others. She recently gave birth to her second child, a healthy son,

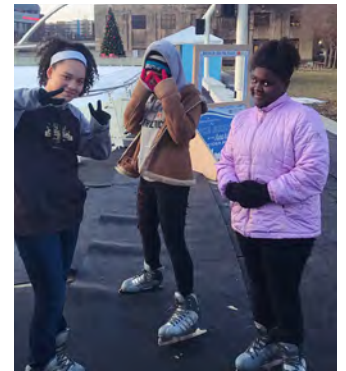
Asaiah. "I was glad they (YWRC) offered me a doula because it was in March, during the pandemic, and I wasn't allowed any family in the room during the birth." The consistent support and advocacy provided made all the difference in what felt like a whole new experience. **"Whenever I needed anything, they were there – even if it was just to talk about silly stuff. And they never judge. That's big."**

"The Young Women's Resource Center is going to support you, they're going to be your advocate for a lot of things. Especially if you're pregnant and going through school, or if there's something you want to do, they will find ways for you to be able to do it. If you're scared, or if you're speaking up for something, they will stand behind you."

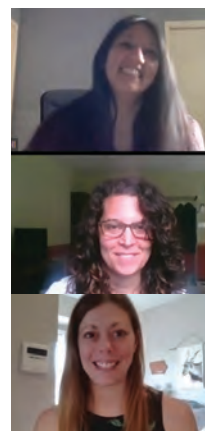

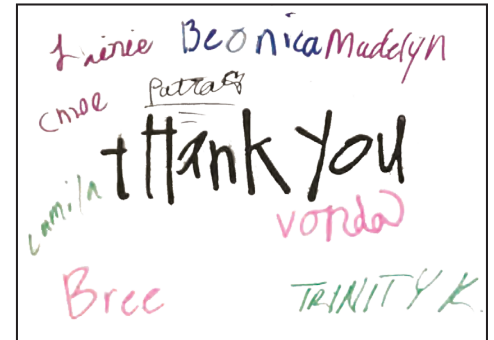
