


YWRC PROGRAM GOALS

IMPACT: COVID-19









From the beginning, FY20-21 was filled with challenges, consistent change, and a multitude of uncertainties due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

We quickly recognized that the pandemic was disproportionately impacting girls and young women, especially Black girls. We heard stories from participants who were often stretched to the limit by taking on additional responsibilities at home, including caregiving and seeking additional employment to financially support their families. Many lost access to school-based support programs that provided basic needs. Several lost their social support systems. Some experienced new or increased trauma in isolation.

When school districts throughout the community implemented COVID-19 policies, nearly all of our Empowerment, Young Moms, and Counseling in-school groups were put on pause. Without the ability to facilitate programs in schools during the last academic year, the number of participants we served was significantly smaller than previous years. In response, our dedicated staff worked tirelessly to reach girls and young women in new ways, especially those we knew needed support and resources the most. While maintaining options for all participants to remain engaged and active with the YWRC, staff also provided extra efforts towards those feeling the impacts of COVID-19 the most. This shift resulted in a much-needed deeper level of support for a smaller number of participants.

We hosted virtual After School Empowerment Groups so participants had a space to socially connect with their peers. During that time, facilitators checked in with participants to ensure they had support and their basic needs were being met. This often meant putting together care packages of essential items and delivering activity kits participants could use during online groups. Staff also encouraged participants to utilize our free and confidential counseling services.

Young Moms program staff saw the shift to a virtual world was leaving young moms behind as many did not have access to a computer or Wi-Fi. Staff adapted to continue reaching young moms by holding in-person groups in parks throughout the Des Moines area, providing one-on-one support via text or phone call, and delivering basic needs (such as shampoo, diapers, formula, and cleaning supplies) directly to participants.

The YWRC staff remained committed to providing participants with opportunities for connection and meeting their physical, mental, emotional, and social needs. Accessibility is a core value that guides our work. We will continue identifying and removing barriers to services throughout the duration of the pandemic, and beyond, to ensure resources are available to those who need support the most.

Comprehensive pregnancy, labor, birth, breastfeeding, and postpartum education

COUNSELING

66 Individuals served

Counseling services are offered for free, and are voluntary and confidential. One-on-one and group counseling empowers participants to identify their strength, develop positive coping skills, build self-esteem, and discover paths to healthy relationships. Creative expression in art therapy opens the door for participants to speak about their feelings (see images below).

CONNECTIONS

Small group for impulse control, anger management and healthy decision-making

Cognitive behavioral counseling and art therapy are offered in individual and group settings




